CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

It gives me great pleasure to provide the Chairperson's Report for the year.

The Club's Operating Profit for the year was \$147,142 and whilst this result is less than last year it still reflects an admirable result for the following reasons.

There were no Government Grants provided or any subsidies for the year.

A new Kitchen Tennant was appointed to correct average trading at best. This decision has resulted in increased profit from Kitchen operations.

Extreme weather conditions hampered results from Tennis operations for the year.

To this very point I would like to congratulate our Tennis Director Glen Jackson for his tireless efforts during the year to correct the effect of the bad weather conditions. We are now experiencing increased traffic through the Club which has resulted in improved total income. A major contributing factor in this year's result is the hard work of our General Manager Peter Lewis and all staff members who again have worked tirelessly and should be congratulated for their efforts. The financial position of our Club has permitted major repairs and maintenance to be undertaken and has further permitted a strong base to work from to continue these repairs and provide an excellent continuance of our Capex Budget. In this regard your Board is about to approve the demolition of the Bowls Pavilion to house a Tennis Pro Shop and a building to house Bowls equipment. This additional space will assist in accommodating additional traffic for the Club.

GENERAL MANAGER AND SECRETARY'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

2022 Financials:

As many of you may be aware, I resigned from the NBC Board and started volunteering at the club in Jan 2019 and consequently took on the GM role.

After a decade of losses, the Club declared a loss of 218K with revenues of 1.7m in 2018. Since then we have recorded a profit each year including this year. In 2022 we increased turnover to 2.2m whilst recording an operating profit of 150k. This was achieved despite over 180 days of wet weather affecting tennis and bowls bookings.

In comparison with 2021 results, If we add additional costs of insurance compliance requirements (20k) and "catch up club" maintenance (20k); no Lion rebate as we had an advance to help fund new bar (40k) and sporting member discounts for 2022 (40k) – the operating results are very respectable.

These results, together with a healthy balance sheet, enable the Board and I to be more strategic and forward-looking. We will be proceeding with the extension of the lady's toilet area to include a new disabled bathroom soon, engage in risk reduction/compliance strategies and formalise plans for a new shed and clubhouse improvements for the future.

Operational investments/improvements:

We took advantage of quieter periods to make significant infrastructure investments totalling \$100k:

- New blinds to the Bay Room and female change area on the first floor
- A newly refurbished men's bathroom on the first floor
- The relocation of the power substation from behind our tennis Court 2 and relocated onto council grass verge on Anderson and removal of the old substation and brick enclosure (which was reported to AUSGRID last year as a structural risk)
- A new wood fired pizza oven installed funded by our new kitchen catering partners Lusso Kitchens.

140 Year Celebrations

Throughout 2022 we arranged themes, merchandise and events to recognise the Club's milestone 140year anniversary including:

- Sourcing and selecting a 140-year commemorative wine and glasses 100% sold.
- Hosting an inaugural Dog show June 19th promoted as 140-year event in partnership with Neutral Bay School which had great coverage during build up with over 300 visitors and participants. Also mentioned in the widely read Mosman Daily and reported by the Hon. Felicity Wilson to the NSW Senate.
- 140-year Men's Peter Russel Bowls Tournament in July badged as a 140-year event with 10 to 12 clubs attending.
- Men's Bowls 2022 shirts branded with one off 140-year logo and sponsored by Heineken.
- Welcome mats at front and rear entrances with 140-year logo.
- Interview with PL published 30/8 with Clubs NSW Magazine Editor regarding the 140 year anniversary and turnaround.

- The NBC article/interview with myself, "From Neutral to Top Gear", published in Club Management Magazine in August (with special thanks to Michelle Hespe) achieved extraordinary exposure in terms of industry recognition and public awareness.
- A much improved and stronger online presence (including the NBC website, Google profile, Facebook and Instagram channels) with a substantial increase in real followers, greater website traffic and a subsequent increase in user engagement.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

The financial report covers The Neutral Bay Club as an individual entity. The Neutral Bay Club is a not-for-profit Company limited by guarantee, incorporated and domiciled in Australia.

The functional and presentation currency of The Neutral Bay Club is Australian dollars. The financial report was authorised for issue by the Directors on <u>**28 April 2023**</u>.

Comparatives are consistent with prior years, unless otherwise stated.

1. Basis of Preparation

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with the Australian Accounting Standards – Simplified Disclosure Statements.

Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

a) Revenue and Other Income

Donations are recognised as revenue when received.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument.

Revenue from the rendering of a service is recognised upon the delivery of the service to the customers.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

The Club's subscription year is 1 January to 31 December. Only those membership subscription receipts which are attributable to the current financial year, are recognised as revenue. Subscription receipts relating to periods beyond the current financial year are shown on the balance sheet under the heading of Other Liabilities.

b) Inventories

Inventories are carried at the lower of cost and net realisable value. The cost of inventories comprises all costs directly related to acquisition, such as freight and delivery charges, and liquor taxes where applicable. Cost is based on first-in, first-out principle. Net realisable value is determined on an item by item basis.

c) Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)

Property, plant and equipment are included at cost of acquisition or at independent or Directors' fair valuation, less any impairment. These assets are depreciated, other than land, over their useful lives commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use, and adjusted for any impairment. The prime cost method (a straight-line basis) is used to depreciate non-current assets. The following depreciation rates are applied:

Tennis Courts	1.5% - 20.0%
Buildings	5.0% - 25%
Bowling Green	10.0%
Furniture, Plant and Equipment	7.5% - 50.0%
Computer Equipment	33.3%

Profits and losses on disposal of property, plant and equipment are taken into account in determining the operating result for the year. Additionally, impairment of property, plant and equipment is reviewed at least annually.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

d) Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period, the entity assesses whether there is any indication that an asset may be impaired. If such an indication exists, an impairment test is carried out on the asset by comparing the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is recognised immediately in profit or loss, unless the asset is carried at a revalued amount in accordance with another Standard (e.g. in accordance with the revaluation model in AASB 116). Any impairment loss of a revalued asset is treated as a revaluation decrease in accordance with that other Standard.

Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the entity estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

Impairment testing is performed annually for goodwill and intangible assets with indefinite lives.

Revaluation

The Directors have adopted a policy of revaluation of land only, at a minimum of three (3) yearly intervals. The revaluation reflects a fair value, by independent assessment of the unimproved capital value (UCV) of land, based on existing or contemplated use, and takes into account market conditions and value levels at the time. The Directors have commissioned a valuation report by Cushman and Wakefield on 24 February 2022. The report provides a valuation of \$8,500,000 for the land.

e) Employee Provisions

Provision is made for the Club's liability for employee entitlements arising from services rendered by employees to balance date. The provisions for annual leave and long service leave (if applicable) have been calculated at nominal amounts based on current wage and salary rates, and include related costs in accordance with the various award requirements. The provision for long service leave is made on a pro-rata basis for all employees who have an excess of five years service.

Superannuation contributions are made by the Club to approved superannuation funds for all employees. The costs are charged as employee expenses as they are incurred. The Club has no legal obligation to cover any shortfall in the superannuation funds' obligations to provide benefits to employees on retirement.

f) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less and bank overdrafts.

g) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST receivable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities, which are recoverable from or payable to the ATO, are presented as operating cash flows included in receipts from customers or payments to suppliers.

h) Income Tax

Income tax has not been provided for in the financial statements, as the Club is exempt from income tax as a sporting body under the provisions of Section 50-45 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

i) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

j) Trade and Other Payables

Trade and other payables and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the company during the reporting period that remain unpaid at the end of the reporting period. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

k) Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgements

The directors evaluate estimates and judgements incorporated into the financial statements based on historical knowledge and best available current information. Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and are based on current trends and economic data, obtained both externally and within the company.

I) Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from donors. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

Overview

The Men's Bowls Section entered the 2022 season in a good position after a strong 2021 season. WOMEN'S BOWLING SECTION ANNUAL REPORT 2022

2022 proved to be a very successful year for our Women's Bowling Club. In terms of membership the Club has 31 full members and based on recent expressions of interest this number is likely to rise.
